16.Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The SNDT Women's University, with a rich legacy spanning 107 years, offers a wide range of multidisciplinary academic programs encompassing Humanities, Liberal Arts, Social Sciences, Science, Technology, and Engineering. From Early Childhood Care Education to doctoral programs across various disciplines, the University is dedicated to meet the evolving needs of women's education. Aligned with National Education Policy (NEP), the University has curated programs and courses aimed at promoting student success and strengthening their career opportunities. Most of the programme developed to foster students' success and enhance their career prospects. In order to facilitate the multidisciplinary approach and create favorable mindsets, the university has taken various steps.

The Centre for Holistic Education, Training and Novel Advancements (SNDTWU-CHETNA) was established by SNDTWU to develop and create a pool of need-based, value-based, skill-based capacity-building add-on courses in collaboration with local, national, and international institutions. It provides courses and programs to build character through human and constitutional values and also, develop life skills, employability skills, and 21st-century skills that are required for the betterment of society, the environment and the whole ecosystem. The name `SNDTWU-CHETNA' means `Consciousness' which is the essence of life. The pool of such courses will keep on increasing and updating over a period of time.

The University established the Bharatiya Gyan, Sanskrit and Yoga Kendra (BHAGYASY) in line with the University's broader vision, with the deep-rooted commitment of the University for exploring and inculcating Indian knowledge-based approaches and practices in the curriculum. The Centre aims at nurturing an ecosystem of teaching-training-learning by encouraging interdisciplinary research, promoted through Indian languages and the Indian knowledge system. The BHAGYASY conducts faculty development programmes , seminars and conferences to propogate the ancient treasure of knowledge . To foster the understanding of the Indian Knowledge system, Ph.D. scholars are expected to complete a credit course on IKS as a part of course-work.

17.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Status of Academic bank of credits (ABC) in 2022-23. University ABC registration was done on ABC portal on 9 th June 2022. Circular sent to colleges/departments for creation of ABCIDs of the students admitted from the academic year 2021-22 on 30 th August 2022 along with manual for creation of ABC ID. Business requirement was also given to the vendor (MKCL) for the provision of ABC ID in the student profile on 30 th August 2022. Further the meeting was conducted with vendor to understand requirements and data validation procedures. The deployment was done by the vendor in college login for uploading ABCIDs of the students on 27 th December 2022. Online campaign was organized for all colleges for creation and uploading of ABC ID, every day at 2 PM from 11 th January 2023 to 24 th January 2023. This campaign included guidance on the creation of ABCID, the process of uploading the ABC ID on DU portal and resolving the difficulties related to it. The WhatsApp group was created and the link was shared with the ABC ID nodal officers of the colleges for resolving the issues and also the Google form was created to collect the status. 19,594 ABCIDs were uploaded by the colleges on DU portal in this academic year.

18.Skill development:

SNDT Women's University (SNDT WU) is a pioneering institution committed to empowering women through education, innovation, and skill development. To offer the Linguistic Diversity SNDTWU has offers skill development courses in multiple Indian languages, including Hindi, Marathi, Gujarati, and English. This allows students to engage with course content in a culturally familiar context, enhancing comprehension and retention which empowers students to embrace and take pride in their linguistic heritage, fostering confidence and self-expression.

To inculcate the Value-Based Education every program in SNDTWU has addition courses/ certifications offered to emphasize values intrinsic to Indian culture, such as empathy, harmony, and sustainability, to instill ethical principles and promote holistic development among students. In addition tio this SNDTWU incorporate celebrations of Indian festivals and cultural events into the curriculum to foster a sense of belonging and cultural identity among students.

To give more accessibility flexibility for students, SNDTWU Offer few of it courses through online platforms allowing them to learn at their own pace and convenience.

20.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

SNDT Women's University (SNDTWU) is dedicated to providing quality education and fostering holistic development among its students. Embracing Outcome-Based Education (OBE) is integral to SNDTWU's commitment to equipping women with the knowledge, skills, and competencies needed to thrive in a rapidly evolving world.

Every Program and all it courses at SNDTWU is OBE focuses on defining clear and measurable POs COs and Los -learning outcomes that articulate what students should know, understand and be able to do upon completion of a program or course. For this SNDTWU collaboratively defines clear and specific learning outcomes for each program and course, ensuring alignment with academic standards, industry requirements, and societal needs.

This helps the university to embrace the Student-Centered Approach , which focus from teaching to learning, placing emphasis on students' mastery of competencies and the attainment of desired learning outcomes. SNDTWU utilizes a mix of formative and summative assessment methods to evaluate student progress and attainment of learning outcomes. Assessment criteria are transparent, aligned with learning outcomes, and provide feedback for improvement. SNDTWU fosters a culture of feedback and reflection among students and faculty, encouraging selfassessment, peer feedback, and reflection on learning experiences to promote continuous improvement.

Integration of Technology: SNDTWU integrates technology into teaching and learning processes to enhance access to resources, facilitate communication, and support personalized learning experiences tailored to individual student needs.

21.Distance education/online education:

In this academic year, a total 1329 students have been admitted. The CDOE, SNDTWU resumed the process of study center recognition. Following the rules and regulations, the degree colleges affiliated with SNDT Women's University were recognized as study centers for CDOE.

The government of Maharashtra's Social Welfare Department initially discontinued scholarships for backward caste students in this year. However, through continuous follow-ups and discussions with the department officials, the scholarship for backward class students has been reinstated for the Distance Education students. The admission process was entirely conducted online in this academic year with online registration, online payment and documents upload. Hall tickets for students were made available online through a digital portal. CDOE programmes and events were promoted

through newspapers across Maharashtra.

The CDOE introduced dual-degree programmes for students, with some B.Ed. students choosing to enroll for M.A. degree through this dual degree programme at the Centre for Distance and Online Education. This initiative provides students an opportunity to pursue two degrees at a time.

Introducing Nursing Informatics in the first semester of the BSc Nursing curriculum aligns with the increasing digitalization of healthcare. It helps student nurses understand how to use technology to manage patient data, improve healthcare delivery, and enhance patient outcomes. This knowledge equips them with skills in electronic health records, telemedicine, and health informatics systems, preparing them for the modern healthcare landscape.

The concerned board of studies in consultation with its members, experts , special invitee o discuss and determine the graduate attributes aligned with programme outcome. The course committees are formulated to decide the content that also includes the inputs from stakeholders.

In the context of NEP 2020 the initiatives are taken up by the university to develop the programmes with adaption of interdisciplinary approach with cultural diversity, technological advancement and global perspective. The provision is also made in the NEP based curricula for adequate flexibility and choices of courses.

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 - Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

The goal of the institution's several curricula is to help students create a well-rounded personality and to prioritise the social and educational requirements of students.

The programmes offered by the university ensures to address

various issues right from local to global. The various courses offer help to take student gradually beyond self to community, nation and global issues.

Diverse combination of courses reflected through 860 local, 891 regional, 898 national and 884 global level relevance. There are 211courses prepares to adress gender issues, 525 to human values, 114 courses environmental sustainability, and 498 to professional ethics. There are 1522 courses generic in nature that instill democratic values, cognitive ability, and critical and creative thinking skills while specialised courses are field specific which encompass 1103 that enhance employability. 1461 courses promote entrepreneurship, technological abilities and research skills.

Students are expected to put efforts in projects, presentations and research that brings diverse subjects with varied issues, challenges, processes, realities and innovations. 2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

The students of SNDTWU arefrom diverse socio-cultural, economic, and educational backgrounds. The University takes various initiatives to help both the high achievers as well as the slow learners.

Departments have 50% weightage towards internal assessments ensuring Continuous Comprehensive Evaluation. This enables teachers to identify learners' area of improvement and accordingly help them.

The strengths of high achievers are utilize in peer tutoring, peer assessment etc. They are assigned with challenging research projects, involved in decision-making processes, complex and challenging assignments and execution of projects of the department.

The teachers make use of LMS like Moodle to foster self-paced and self directed learning. The resources available on learning management system provide the accessbility tolearners in general and low achievers in specific to learnat their own pace and revise content anytime. The group centric methods used by teachers focus on peer-learning and peer-assessment ensuring collaboration among low, high and average achievers. Training is provided to the students to appear and excel in competitive exams like IAS, IPS, IFS, NET SET, GATE, GRE, TOEFL etc. University also provides training in personality development and soft skills. Experts from the industry and alumnaecontribute to a large extent to achieve the objective.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problemsolving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Learner-centric methods as emphasized by NEP-2020, have always been the central focus of all University programmes. The University has been a pioneer in initiating learner-centric approaches in all its programmes. SNDTWU offers several programmes across the disciplines ranging from Social Sciences to Vocational training.

Participatory strategies such as classroom discussions, presentations, group-activities, exhibitions, use of scenarios, case studies, etc. are commonly used in teaching-learning processes. Collaborative and cooperative learning strategies (CLS) are practiced. CLS majorly include Jigsaw, Think-Pair-Share, Team-Pair-Solo, etc. Experiential learning is achieved through individual and group projects, role-plays, field visits, etc Simulations, workshops are regularly used so as to enhance creativity that is reflected through the creative products.

Involvement of learners in day-to-day teaching-learning is achieved through collaborative platforms and ICT tools. Studentled events are a unique strength of SNDTWU. Students come together to organize conferences, on-line events and conduct workshopStudents participate in the conferences at national and international levels as well as publish research papers. Assessment-evaluation strategies like module-preparations, open book exams, case-study based problems assess creativity, relevance, and critical analysis of the students.

SNDTWU incubation centre WISE and UMIT Entrepreneurship Cell organize activities to encourage entrepreneurship as well as marketing skills. Projects, research studies are encouraged leading to learner-centric tasks.

2.3.2 - Teachers use ICT enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning processes during the year

ICT tools consist of eResources for self-learning, references and research review, platforms for synchronous communication and collaborative learning tools being used by learners. SNDTWU teachers use ICT and eResources for all three purposes. eResources, journals, eBooks are often used by faculty for their own preparations, research review and upgradation of knowledge. ICT integration has been planned and followed since last 11+ years. Faculty receives training from time-to-time. Pandemic witnessed use of GMeet which still continues alongwith other tools as well as SNDTWU's official LMS Moodle, Canvas, Edmodo and G-Classroom.

Shodhganga, purchased databases accessed through KNimbus are commonly used for references and review. Collaborative tools to facilitate small group as well as individual learning processes are majorly Google based tools which are used by teachers as follows:GDoc (70%+); G-Spreadsheet (17%); G-Drawing (17%), GSlides (90%+), Jamboard (31%). Conceptboard, Miro, Mindomo, Padlet, Sketchup, Piktochart, Canva, etc. are used for creation and cocreation among learners. Besides GForm, used by 92% teachers), Kahoot, Testmoz, Pollevertwhere, Quizlet are also popular quiz tools often used.

Five technology teachers are using Online programming tools as well.

85+ classrooms are ICT enabled and 4 Smart Classrooms are installed to demonstrate smart classes. SNDTWU is in the process of installing smart classes across the campuses.

Examination result processing system has an interface with the DU (MKCL) portal of the University. Hence all pre-examination data, course structure etc. can be easily synchronized in the ERPS system. This avoids monotomous and repetitive work. The processed result can be easily published on the DU portal. Students can see their results in their respective login. Any changes in course structure/pattern can be easily migrated to ERPS. In the Academic year 2022-23, all the remaining examinations are migrated from legacy to the new ERPS system. Convocation Report and Degree Printing Data are generated and downloaded from ERPS.

Students can apply for a Migration certificate online and it is generated in the system based on the information provided by the student. Distance Education students can do their admission through students' login. Once admission is done I-card is made available in their login.

Degree certificates of the academic year 2013-14, 2014-15, 2020-21 are uploaded on Digilocker portal. Sample cases of Marksheet data are uploaded on the Digilocker for the Academic year 2021-22.

When it comes to SNDT Women's University, graduating attributes are focused towards all hard and soft skills to make all women graduates empowered. At times they demonstrate entrepreneurship skills which are the base of curricula, teachinglearning processes leading to congruent assessment and evaluation.

Appropriate cognitive, skill-based and attitudinal changes are reflected in Programme Outcomes of all programmes, in light of which even the Course Outcomes and Learning Outcomes are clearly defined.

All one-credit modules, the micro-capsule of the syllabi begin with these Los. The assignments, assessment strategies, projects mentioned in the syllabi help achieving these LOs. Use of innovative evaluation strategies demanding creative products, projects, presentations, infographics, etc. is ensured. Varied assessment strategies help in assessing LOs of higher order. e.g. Blog-writing for reflection, concept-map for synthesis, projects for skill applications and problem-solving. Use of rubrics brings specificity and objectivity in evaluation.

The syllabi consisting of POs, COs and LOs alongwith the varied assessment activities are available on the website, internal groups of students are connected through social media platforms as well as on Moodle LMS for LMS-user classes.

SNDT Women's University follows a balanced form of assessment with learner-centric approach. Internal-external assessment ratio at PG level is 50-50 which is a unique step in itself. Assignments are strictly different than a mere paper-pencil test. Presentations, products, essays, surveys, exhibits, creative work, etc.. are designed in light of the well-designed Learning Outcomes which are aligned and reflect Course Outcomes. Every course of 4-credit consists of Course Outcomes reflecting sense of the Programme Outcomes. Assessment outputs are congruent to Outcomes. Skillbased courses are assessed through practical and product designs. Use of ICT for creation and co-creation of such products is practiced. Small action research, visits and report of the visit, blog-writing, posts on discussion forums, book review, quizzes, case studies etc. are also planned.

Mapping of the POs and COs with achievements of the learners obtained by evaluating these internal assessment activities, help in providing a vivid picture of effectiveness of teaching-learning environment. Learners can be mentored and guided further to improve their cognitive and physical, technical skills.

Apart from the major chunk of Continuous Comprehensive Evaluation, achievement in summative assessment is mapped to get an idea about overall effectiveness of the programme.

The research facilities undergo regular modernization to meet evolving needs. The research facilities Central Instrumentation Centre ,Animal House/Green House,Media laboratory/Studios Business Lab,Research/Statistical Databases ,Mootcourt and weather station available for research. Both staff and students receive training to utilize these resources effectively.

Following UGC guidelines, a research development cell is established, featuring committees for finance, infrastructure, program development, policy formulation, collaboration, community engagement, product development, monitoring, commercialization, IPR, legal, and ethical matters. These entities collectively foster a research-friendly environment.Regular meetings of the dynamic research advisory committee occur to strategize programs aimed at promoting research and cultivating ethical research practices. Student research is bolstered through mini and major projects

Special lectures on various research-related topics like manuscript writing, research ethics, IPR, and research proposal composition are conducted periodically to enrich understanding. Seed funding is provided to incentivize teachers and postgraduate students to embark on research projects.

One notable platform that amplifies research engagement is "Avishkar," an annual research convention in which SNDTWU students participate regularly. The convention fosters innovative thinking and scholarly endeavours. Successful participants receive financial support to develop their research projects.

For advanced research pursuits, SNDTWU offers comprehensive Ph.D. programme across all subjects through its Post graduate departments .

SNDT Women's University's BharatRatna Maharshi Karve Knowledge Resource Centre (BMK KRC) spans its main campus in Churchgate, Mumbai, with branches in Pune and Juhu, as well as a Children's Library in Juhu. Since its inception in 1955, the KRC has evolved into a repository of over 400,000 books, embracing digital formats and offering open access to users worldwide.

The KRC boasts a diverse collection in multiple languages, covering various disciplines such as social sciences, women's studies, arts, literature, nursing, and management. Membership privileges extend to nearly 4000 students, faculty, and staff, facilitating reading, audio-visual resources, borrowing, and reference services, along with computer and internet access.

In 2007, the library embraced automation with the SLIM 21 software (https://sndt.ac.in/library/universitycatalogue), facilitating cataloging and resource management. Recently transitioning to KOHA, an open-source library automation software, the KRC enhances functionalities like acquisitions, cataloging, serials and circulation.

Furthermore, the KRC embraces digitization through DSpace (http://120.63.216.208:8090/jspui/), preserving scholarly publications, theses, dissertations, and archival materials. A commitment to academic integrity is upheld through the use of DrillBit plagiarism detection software, ensuring originality in research submissions. Additionally, accessibility is prioritized with the provision of JAWS software, aiding visually impaired users in navigating Windows computers.

An important studyon the "Assessment of physical and mental health status of geriatric women in ruralMaharashtra: A post COVID-19 pandemic analyses was conducted which was one-of-a-kindstudy, assessing a largely marginalized population. Maharashtra State Faculty DevelopmentAcademy in association with the university steered an FDP on 'Gender Sensitization' whichwas instrumental in transforming and reorienting the teaching faculty thereby reaching thousands of students across Maharashtra. Closer home 'Self Défense' workshop was heldfor students to prepare them to face unwarranted situations. Opening the discussions to intersectional issues, lectures on gender and science, electoral policies, gendered methodsof quantitative analysis and rights of differently abled women were highlights of the academic calendar. Inauguration of a crèche facility in the university ensured conduciveworking spaces for women without compromising on their care giving roles. Women's equalparticipation in the workforce was not limited to textbooks

The University diligently manages its waste disposal procedures, adhering closely to theoutlined policies for waste segregation and disposal across its departments and centres. Through regular training sessions, both staff and students are actively engaged in upholdingthe university's commitment to effective waste segregation practices. At the Juhu campus, biodegradable solid waste is effectively managed in a vermincomposting system. This system, was inaugurated in November 2020, it converts thesewaste items into nutrient-rich manure. Apart from this, ten composting stations are also installed at Juhu campus for effective management

of solid wet waste generated atcanteens. Every month approximately 33 kgs of solid wet waste is converted into manureswith the help of these ten composting stations. E waste generated in the University is collected and disposed separately as per universitypolicy. The university green policy is available at https://sndt.ac.in/pdf/policies/green-campus-policy C. U. Shah College of Pharmacy maintains an animal house facility registered with CPCSEA, Govt of India, ensuring ethical treatment and disposal of bio-waste resulting from animalexperimentation. The bio-waste disposal follows BMC guidelines, which is facilitated througha contract by a BMC-appointed agency, SMS Envoclean, The university is actively pursuing a reduction in paper consumption through the digitization of documents. It promotes the use of recycled products and advocates for repurposingexisting equipment, such as computers for labs, while ensuring full utilization of resources before considering disposal. These efforts underscore the university's dedication tosustainability
